

The team at Dance Cork Firkin Crane are very saddened to hear of the passing of Aerowaves founding director John Ashford in December 2023.

As Director of both The Place Theatre (1986–2009) and Aerowaves (1996–2022), John promoted artists' careers in the UK, Europe and beyond, and he also encouraged the development of criticism as part of the culture in which dance grows. In recognition of his influence, innovations and commitment, he received the 'Lifetime Achievement Award' at the Critics' Circle National Dance Awards (UK) in June 2022, where he spoke of being "of service to and through dance".

John will be greatly missed by his colleagues and the wider dance community. In honour of his memory, this season's programme is dedicated to John Ashford.

Celebrating the strength of mature bodies and challenging the cult of youth, *Dances Like a Bomb* is a reclaiming of the ageing body created by dance-theatre innovators Junk Ensemble. Featuring acclaimed actor Mikel Murfi and leading dance artist Finola Cronin (formerly of Pina Bausch's Tanztheater Wuppertal), the performers are heroic, vulnerable, comedic, and completely themselves in the work. They care fiercely for each other and defend their independence. As they hold each other up and push each other down, the 'performance' of age is unpacked as a reminder of ourselves: our worst and our best.

Company / Artist Bio:

Junk Ensemble is a multi-award-winning Dublinbased dance theatre company founded by twin sisters Megan Kennedy and Jessica Kennedy. Currently Associate Artists at Project Arts Centre and previous Artists-in-Residence at The Tate, Junk Ensemble has built a reputation as one of Ireland's leading voices in dance.

TAKE OFF FESTIVAL

Grab your seats as we *Take Off* with Dance Cork Firkin Crane's (DCFC) festival, now in its second year. *Take Off* (modelled on Dance Limerick's (DL) *What Next Festival*) celebrates and showcases thrilling dance artists from Ireland and Europe. *Take Off* features international choreographers' works, chosen from the Aerowaves Twenty23 selected artists, presented on shared programmes alongside the work of Irish choreographers.

Each year the Aerowaves network, in which Dance Cork Firkin Crane and Dance Limerick are partners, selects 20 of the most promising choreographers in Europe from a competitive open call. Partners are committed to annually presenting up to three of these Top 20. With the goals of maximising the impact of inviting these artists to Ireland, saving on travel time and commitments, and promoting more sustainable touring, DCFC is collaborating with DL on selecting the artists, and will present their works in Cork the week following their Limerick performances.

All artists in the festival will gather in Cork throughout the week to share their practice. Each performance will be followed by a Q&A and a reception with the artists to deepen audiences' engagement with the work. The *Take Off Festival* will introduce the artists to each other and to our audiences, not just in the studio and onstage, but also in informal social gatherings. Slant revolves around a woman who wants to tells us something. But she can't tell it straight. Or so she tells us. She has to come at it sideways: to tell it slant. She is not trying to hide anything. No. Slipping in and out between speaking and moving she lists all the 'things' her dance is not about. Not. Stripping away. No. Not her clothes. She finds something. A palpable no-thing which is not nothing. She tells us. Then at the end of all the speaking. Silence. She dances with it.

Company / Artist Bio:

Markers of time passing in Mary's dance career include: choreographer, performer with Dublin Contemporary Dance Theatre (1981-1986), founder and Artistic Director of Daghdha Dance Company (1988-1999), Course Director of the MA in Contemporary Dance Performance, UL (1991-2016). Nunan is currently an independent dance artist.

Born in Spain, she trained in ballet and contemporary dance, earning a BA in Physical Education. Éist is both a performance and film project created by Irish dance artist Stephanie Keane. In *Éist* we are invited to listen to the dancer and explore the musicality of Sean Nós dance, an ancient free-style Irish dance. Inspired by Irish traditional and electronic music, this piece speaks to wider themes of identity, defying conventions and pushing boundaries.

Company / Artist Bio:

Stephanie has travelled all over Ireland and Europe, performing and collaborating with some of the best Irish traditional musicians. Her performance style combines the best elements of Sean Nós dancing with her fiery individuality built from a keen sense of tradition. She connects with the music, dancing the tune with her feet, and naturally understands the musician's interpretation of the tune. Her style is free flowing, energetic and wild.

Trapped under the burning halo of a pitiless light, they will keep on shaking until the tragically repeated echo of countertenor Klaus Nomi's entreaties in Purcell's Cold Song reaches its complete disintegration. *Believe* is part of Structure-couple's ongoing series of duets, created in collaboration with the musician Jean-Luc Guionnet.

Company / Artist Bio:

Lotus Eddé Khouri and Christophe Macé have been working together since 2014, creating seven choreographic miniatures based on the principle of original movement, challenged by endurance and repetition, progressively deformed in response to the distortions of a looped popular music track.

Lotus Eddé Khouri's dance works range from solos to extended group pieces, stage and site-specific performances as well as videos. Christophe Macé is primarily a sculptor who graduated from the School of Beaux Arts in Paris.

Mufutau Yusuf is in the process of creating *Impasse*, a work that explores the diasporic experience, particularly the black African diaspora. It questions what it means to be a diasporic entity, how one inhabits spaces in which one's existence is not clearly marked, and how memory becomes critical to one's identity. The work also attempts to understand the nuances and complexities around the autonomy of black bodies. During this residency, Yusuf will be working with Congolese dancer Lucas Katangila.

Mufutau Yusuf is a performer, choreographer, teacher, and curator. He works as a freelance artist between Ireland and Brussels. A recipient of many awards, he is currently an associate artist with Liz Roche Company and Solstice Arts Centre, and is a co-curator of the workshop platform 'TW1'.

Siobhán Ní Dhuinnín (Ireland) COUNTRY OK (PRODUCTION RESIDENCY)

Siobhán Ní Dhuinnín will work with dancers Marion Cronin and Sarah Ryan to develop the material for her new performance, *Country OK*, which will take place as part of Cork Midsummer Festival in June 2024.

Country OK is a rollicking celebration of dance featuring an inter-generational cast of dancers from communities across Cork. DANCE ARTIST IN RESIDENCE

Dance Cork Firkin Crane and Cork City Council are delighted to announce choreographer and performer Luke Murphy as Cork City Dance Artist in Residence 2024-2026, having been chosen from a competitive national call earlier this year.

In this residency, Murphy aims to not only embed his current practice in Dance Cork Firkin Crane and Cork City, but to bring a greater visibility to dance in Cork and promote greater sustainability for dance artists in the area. Across his residency weeks Luke will continue development on two long term projects, *The Prometheus Project* and *Scorched Earth*.

The Prometheus Project reimagines the Greek myth as a modern parable around power, consumption and dependency. Envisaged as a series of interlinking performance installations, each space depicts another member of a shared community readying themselves for the final hours of electricity. Scorched Earth is a new large scale dance theatre work for five performers circling a fictional murder, the prime suspect and the importance of understanding why. Navigating themes of ownership, ambition, desire, sacrifice, parochialism and quiet corners of the Irish Identity, Scorched Earth is a world of fantasy, dance and theatre all wrapped in the tangled knot of a murder mystery and investigative drama.

Speaking about the residency, Luke states: 'It's both a pleasure and a privilege to be working with Dance Cork Firkin Crane and Cork City Council Arts Office as Dance Artist in Residence for Cork from 2024-2026. As a Cork native and Cork based artist, I'm delighted to be able to more firmly base my practice in Cork City and work with both organisations to help bring greater visibility to contemporary dance in Cork.'

Following seven successful years programming and producing the Catch8 Workshop Series, Luke is excited to use the role of Dance Artist in Residence as an opportunity to re-explore the needs and challenges of professional development for dance artists in Cork and more widely throughout Ireland. In early 2024, Luke will begin a process of exploration and discussion with local and national dance artists leading towards revitalised workshop programmes catering to the diverse and varied nature of dance and creative practice locally and nationally.

INCLUSIVE DANCE CORK

We are delighted to announce that Inclusive Dance Cork (IDC) is continuing from January through May 2024, with thanks to funding from the Disability Participation and Awareness Fund from ReThink Ireland, and an anonymous donor through the Community Foundation for Ireland. It is designed for dancers with and without disabilities to explore expressive movement and discuss a variety of ways to dance, facilitate, and support dancers of all abilities. This year's programme features workshops led by Artistic Director Rhona Coughlan along with guest facilitators including Adam Benjamin, Marc Brew, Mary Hartney, and Cindy Cummings.

IDC began in September 2022 and is open to all who are interested in learning inclusive dance methods. The course is the only accredited programme of its kind in the Republic of Ireland.
